### From the Rabbi's Desk

#### CAA Annual Meeting June 14, 2023

With the image of a three-legged stool in our minds – an image that evokes a stable foundation for whatever rests upon it – we Jews have long taught that the existence of the Jewish people and even the entire human race depends on three things. For example, in the Mishnah, the earliest body of rabbinic law and lore, the Men of the Great Assembly teach that "the world stands on three things: on Torah, on prayer/ worship, and on acts of lovingkindness."

In thinking about what sustains the Jewish People, per se, many Jewish thinkers have suggested "God, Torah, and Israel." Using this well-worn model of "*al shlosha devarim* – on three things," I'd like to reflect on the past year at CAA using the categories of mind, body, and spirit – three essential aspects of a whole person as well as a whole community.

Diagnosing our congregation's state of wellness from the vantage point of mind, body and spirit, I would say that CAA is doing very well. Indeed, we have much to be proud of and thankful for. Of course, too, there is plenty of room improvement so we can become even more vigorous. As satisfied as I think we all are with the past year, I am certain that we all have even greater hopes and expectations for the year to come.

year to satisfy the intellectual needs of our members and the broader community. Kudos to Randy Carmel, for example, for planning a diverse series of Nathan E. Cohen lectures that addressed topics from American folk music, to the Holocaust, to Jewish music. Kudos are due, too, to Paul Bieber and his committee that

initiated a community-wide conversation about anti-semitism in our region.

In addition to these events, which together brought in many dozens, if not hundreds of guests from the community, we've had rich conversations about current events, literature, Torah, and Israel. Though many people are to be thanked for making those conversations happen, I want to express our community's gratitude, in particular, to the Jewish Federation of New Hampshire for making its Israeli shaliach or educational emissary available to our religious school, teens, and adults. Ra'anan de Haas grew a healthy following of learners among all three groups over his two years here in New Hampshire. That our teen group is the largest and most engaged of any in New Hampshire is due, in no small measure, to the appeal Ra'anan has had to our teens.

In our religious school, our teachers showed up faithfully each week and did their best to bolster our children's pride in being Jewish and to give them the building blocks to engage with Torah, Hebrew, and Jewish life. Thank you to Roye Ginsberg, Jeff Cohen, Lainee Ginsberg, Daniella Yitzchak, and Wendy Fulton for being my partners in educating our youth. Thank you, too, to Emily and Rebecca Fulton, our teen assistants for all they did to help out as well.

I've had the pleasure this year of teaching several groups of adults. I spent the fall teaching Hebrew I to twelve adult learners, half of whom continued to study Hebrew II this spring. I had a conversion student who completed her studies this spring, and two b'nai mitzvah, Josh Patriquin and Sand Seligman, who brought great pride and joy to our community, to their families, and to themselves. Finally, every month I've presented on "Timely Topics in Jewish Life" to a group of about 15 seniors at Covenant Living of Keene. Those sessions are open to everyone in our community, and I hope you will join us in the coming months.

As for next year, several people have expressed interest in learning about the structure and content of the prayer book and also about exploring end-of-life issues. In response to these requests, following the High Holy Days I will begin a year-long course on Jewish prayer utilizing a classic curriculum called "Higher and Higher: Making Jewish Prayer Part of Us," and I will offer an extended discussion series on Sunday mornings called "Walking the Jewish Path toward the End of Life," which will include an occasional outside speaker to talk about issues like estate planning, caring for aging parents, and hospice care. Watch out for registration forms in the fall for both of these programs.

As we care for the mind, we must also care for the Body of CAA. I think of the body of the congregation in terms of those things that transform us from a collection of individuals and families to a vibrant, caring community as well as those things that we do through governance and administration to keep the body of CAA moving.

Here I need to give a shout out to Robin Kost, chair of the Kesher community, for the work she and her committee has done to offer fun, social opportunities that allow us to bond as a community. These have included a game night, a Super Bowl party, a movie night in a freezing cold Sukkah, a talent show, and our annual picnic at the home of Paul and Elaine Bieber. The Kesher committee welcomes all ideas as they plan next year's activities. You can send ideas directly to Robin, to me, or to Daniella in the office.

Following in the footsteps of his predecessors, Roye Ginsberg has continued the work of leading our officers and board of directors to ensure that all aspects of CAA's functioning are done with responsible guidance and oversight. Roye has worked hard to create a safe, welcoming, and inclusive environment for our board meetings, and I am excited to work hand-in-hand with Roye and the board in the coming year to build upon the work they've already done. Yasher Koach, Roye, on a job well done.

Recognizing that CAA is part of a larger body of Keene and the Monadnock Region, Roye has been a tireless advocate for building relationships with other groups and organizations throughout the wider community, including the Monadnock Interfaith Project, One Hundred Nights, the Community Kitchen, and the Cohen Center. I can't say enough about those individuals who give tirelessly of their time, effort, and money to support these organizations and so many others that care for the most vulnerable in our midst.

A number of committees, large and small, convene as needed to tend to the needs of our community. Please, please let CAA's leaders know that you would like to serve on a committee or volunteer with our programs. We will find the right place for you to serve and, hopefully, grow as a future leader of CAA. Volunteers truly are the lifeblood of our congregation.

Of course, it takes more than volunteers to keep the body moving. We are blessed to have Daniella Yitzchak managing our office, our facilities, our communications, and our challahs, and to have Eric and Lorraine Cone caring for the cleanliness of our building. Please join me in thanking them for all they do to keep our communal body healthy.

Finally, I'd like to talk about the Spirit of CAA, that is, worship, celebration, and caring.

I already mentioned the two b'nai mitzvah this year, Josh and Sand. Preparing to become a bar/ bat mitzvah is challenging for anyone, but for adults there are special fears and obstacles to overcome. Our sense of competency gets challenged, and our willingness to take certain risks declines over time. Sand certainly rose to the occasion and became an inspiration for all of us. If you'd like to study to become a bar or bat mitzvah, as Sand did, please let me know.

Our High holy day services were especially meaningful and beautiful this year. Lainee always does a wonderful job in her own right, but she is also very skillful in making space for others and having them make their mark on the experience, as well. The vocals of Lainee, Laura Broad, and Eleanor Kaufman were incredibly moving, so much so that we will soon have available a cd of High Holy Day music from this terrific trio for you to enjoy. In addition to outstanding vocals, we are also blessed to weave the talents of Craig Sylvern, Virginia Eskin, and Rebecca Sayles into our High Holy Day services. Finally, thank you to Craig Sylvern for producing that CD and for tending to all of CAA's audio-visual needs.

Clearly, there are some spiritual needs that we can do a better job of meeting. For instance, many people's experience of the Divine happens outdoors in the midst of the natural world. Therefore, I'd like to revive a practice begun by my predecessor and have us spend Shabbat together in nature every now and then.

Finally, I am in talks with a colleague in Houston, TX, to have us join his congregation periodically so that congregants here can have a more regular experience with Shabbat morning worship and also build their Torah reading skills. I look forward to announcing details about that initiative in the near future.

I cannot talk about the Spirit of CAA without also talking about the Caring Committee, led by Paul and Elaine Bieber. Paul and Elaine are truly remarkable, and they are joined by so many other members with huge hearts in caring for those who are grieving or recovering from illness or a medical procedure. The Caring Committee needs more people to step up, however, so we can more evenly spread opportunities to perform the mitzvah of caring for the bereaved and ill.

The Mind, Body and Soul of CAA are doing just fine. As your rabbi, I am blessed to play a role in keeping our community healthy and hale. I thank you for the trust you've placed in me by renewing my contract for five years. I plan to continue to earn your trust, and I welcome your constructive input as we go on this journey together.

Congratulations to our board members and officers for an outstanding year. May we go from strength to strength.

### A Letter from the President

It has been a memorable year for all of us at CAA. Developing our community has been my primary goal. This has meant outreach to increase our membership to 105 family units, as well as increasing the engagement of the current members. The board of directors, committee members, and other volunteers have been essential in developing our strong community. I am very thankful to so many members of our synagogue who have helped us to both improve and continue to serve the needs of our 105 family units.

Achievements and challenges over this past year have been extraordinary. A significant accomplishment was for Rabbi Dan and the Board of Directors to agree to a new five year contract. I thank the members of the negotiating committee for their thoughtful work on our behalf, including Jane Taylor, David Kochman, and Paul Bieber.

The 2022 High Holidays went especially well. The services went smoothly, were meaningful, and extremely well-attended. I want to thank the following people from the bottom of my heart for their steadfast devotion to the success of our services: my dear wife Lainee Ginsberg and her mother Laura Broad, and Eleanor Kaufman; Craig Sylvern and the entire tech crew; Risa Keene and Sarah Vogel; Daniella Yitzhak; and, of course, Rabbi Dan. As they say, it takes a village, and our team really rose to the occasion this past year.

I would like to mention the remarkable success of a recent outreach project. Rabbi Dan, as a member of the Interfaith Clergy Group of the Monadnock Interfaith Project, organized an Interfaith Seder, in conjunction with the leaders of MIP, including myself. The very wellattended event was held at Keene State College

in April. It was co-led by Reverend Sandra Whippie of the Walpole Unitarian Church and drew over 80 participants of different faith traditions from throughout the Monadnock region. The attendees were respectful and inquisitive; Rabbi Dan was

gracious, welcoming, and informative, and the entire event brought joy and a renewed sense of community to all present. The sense of connection the participants in the room felt to one another was indeed meaningful. We hope to repeat this event in the years to come.

I remember with excitement the first public Menorah lighting on Central Square in Keene, which occurred this past December. Mayor Hansel and former State Senator Jay Kahn spoke. The event was attended by over 100 folks who were members of our community as well as many interfaith friends. Rabbi Dan led the event on a chilly December night. Lainee led us all in song, and the event was covered by the *Keene Sentinel*. The mayor was so impressed by the whole event that he proposed we make this an annual celebration. Many thanks to Rabbi Dan for putting the Jewish community in such a wonderful light.

CAA hosted a panel discussion on Anti-Semitism in the region in January. This event was also well attended by both Jews and friends of the Jewish community, and was made possible by the vision and dedication of the committee members: Lisa Leinau, Sarah Patriquin, Jay Kahn, chair Paul Bieber, and myself.

The Adult Education programs, including the Nathan E. Cohen Lecture Series chaired by Randall Carmel, have drawn large crowds. The lecture given by Dr. Paul Vincent and the concert by Mak'hela were very well received. The performance by Jeff Warner, "Songs of Old New Hampshire," was also very successful. Ra'anan de Haas's lectures about Israeli politics and about the new tribes of Israel were also well attended.

The primary purpose of the Kesher Committee has been to increase the connectivity of our community. The committee has met this objective with flying colors. The chair, Robin Kost, and her committee, arranged the following activities:

- The annual Summer Picnic at the Bieber's residence (including fire truck);
- The famous annual Kosher Q (made possible by the devoted volunteers)

- Thank you Mike Davern and Mark Thomas for stepping up into leadership roles for the 2023 Kosher-Q.
- Other Kesher events included the Blessing of the Animals (led by Rabbi Dan as Noah), Soup and Challah Making (led by Daniella), The Super Bowl Watch Party, group Swamp Bat baseball game gatherings, and the very popular post-Shabbat Game Night.

There are other interesting activities going on at CAA. Alyse Bettinger has organized the monthly Rosh Chodesh women's gathering. My vision for next year is to continue all the above mentioned activities and find even more ways to engage the members of our community!

I'd like to thank many people for their tireless commitment to CAA, including David Kochman, our treasurer, who donates 10-15 hours per week to taking care of our finances. Thank you, David.

This year I have chosen Risa Keene to be the recipient of the Shem Tov Award. For a good number of years, Risa, assisted recently by Sarah Vogel, has been entrusted with the monumental task of organizing and assigning all the readings (Hebrew and English) for the entire High Holiday season. There aren't enough words of praise to thank her for this job!

I'd like to thank Vivian Prunier for a successful year of leadership of the Ritual Practices Committee. The RPC is the umbrella committee which oversees the High Holidays, special services, issues regarding the cemetery, and many more topics that arise during the year.

I also thank Dr. Marni Silverstein, for her years of service as a trustee on the board. I am pleased to welcome her husband, Mike Davern, who is replacing Marni on the board. I also welcome Sol Silberstein, who is joining Noah Davern as a youth representative on the board.

Thank you to Craig Sylvern for his ongoing leadership with CAA's technology, making it possible to have Zoom and hybrid services all year long with state-of-the-art equipment. We are pleased to announce that CAA will have new speakers and additional audio equipment installed in time for the High Holidays. Thank you, Craig, for volunteering your expertise and time. 


### Join Us at Ahavas Achim's 54th Annual Kosher-Q


