From the Rabbi's Desk

The "Time of the Giving our Torah" Is Now and Always

One of the names given to the late springtime holiday of Shavuot, is z'man matan Torateinu, literally "the time of the giving of our Torah." It's a curious name in part because of the lack of agreement among Jews across history of what was revealed at Mt. Sinai and what time frame is meant by the Hebrew z'man, more accurately translated as "historical event, time period or era."^{1,2} How we understand z'man matan *Torateinu* says volumes about who we are, what we believe, and how we behave as Jews and human beings.

Rabbis and scholars from the late second Temple period to today have offered different views of z'man matan Torateinu. Rabbis in the Talmud basically said Shavuot celebrates the giving of the Decalogue, aka "The Ten Commandments," in a single moment of time from within a cloud of smoke, amidst lightning and thunderous blasts of the shofar. In the Middle Ages, some rabbis argued that Shavuot celebrates the giving of all the *mitzvot* (commandments) of the Torah, of which tradition says there are 613, during Moses's 40-day encampment with God atop Mt. Sinai.

Others said it was all the *mitzvot* and the stories, as well, which would extend the period

to, perhaps, the forty years of wandering. Later in Jewish history, some rabbis argued that "z'man matan Torateinu" included the entire period ofthe Talmud, from the first through sixth centuries CE.

Another view entirely is that
Shavuot celebrates the ongoing, unending revelation of the

Divine presence that began at the beginning of time itself. It is that ongoing revelation of God's self that constitutes Torah. That Torah is revealed uniquely to the Jewish people through *mitzvot*, stories and history, and universally to all humanity through ethics, arts, and knowledge.³ All that is revealed is the stuff that brings meaning and beauty to our lives. In this view, *z'man matan Torateinu* is eternal and allembracing.

As a non-Orthodox Jew, who has found a Jewish spiritual and intellectual home within Reconstructionist Judaism, I subscribe to this latter view.⁴ I believe we experience the revelation of Torah whenever we open a book, attend a lecture, listen to a wise person, discover something new about ourselves, uncover a previously hidden secret of the natural world, or experience awe. Like Maimonides, Abraham Joshua Heschel, and Mordecai Kaplan, I believe that faith and reason are both absolutely essential to knowing God.

The implications of seeing *z'man matan Torateinu* as eternal and all-embracing are apparent in what we do here at CAA as a sacred community. When we get to know one another through prayer, social activities, social justice, and acts

of caring, we open ourselves to the revelation of Torah. Indeed, all that we do to better understand one another brings us closer to understanding the One in whose image we are all made. When we study the weekly Torah portion, learn about the indigenous peoples upon whose land our synagogue lies, listen to a scholar of American folk music, discuss great literature and the pressing issues of our day, strive to improve our reading of Hebrew, or acquire the skills of mindfulness, we open ourselves to the revelation of Torah. We receive Torah whenever our hearts and minds are open.

One final note: z'man matan Torateinu – the time of the giving of our Torah - is experienced only in relationship. The "giving of our Torah" requires there to be a "giver" and a "receiver," after all. Sometimes the giver is an exquisite scene of beauty. Sometimes the giver is an author. What gives me great pleasure is to witness members of the CAA community giving Torah to one another through teaching, through organizing educational and social programs, through strengthening the organizational structures that allow Jewish life and learning to flourish, through caring for those in need and celebrating with those experiencing great joy. There are just so many ways in which each of us is a giver of Torah!

As the festival of Shavuot nears, may we celebrate the Torah each of us receives each and every day and give thanks to the Giver of Givers, whose presence is always near.

¹ In addition to the ambiguity of "Torah" in this name for Shavuot, another curious aspect that I will not discuss here is the fact that the Written Torah, including all of TaNaKh, never gives the revelation at Sinai as a reason for celebrating Shavuot! A Letter from the President

Dear Congregation,

Shavuot is a festival that is all about receiving the Torah, wheat harvests, studying Torah, strong women, and even cheesecake! It celebrates the completion of the seven-week Omer counting between Passover and Shavuot.

We believe that the Jews received 613 *mitzvot* from G-d on Mount Sinai. A covenant was created between G-d and the Jews. The Jewish people agreed to follow the *mitzvot* (as much as possible) and G-d promised to bless the Jewish people if the Jews obeyed the commandments. The Jews were given the choice to follow the commandments, the same choices we face today.

An example of choice is the story of Ruth, a non-Jewish woman, whose love for G-d and Torah led her to convert to Judaism. At the synagogue services on Shavuot, we read the *Book of Ruth*.

The choices we make to follow the *mitzvot* give meaning to our lives. The laws of the *mitzvot* are a guide of how to live our daily lives. Laws are the essence of a civilized society.

I am recalling a discussion I had with one of my Sunday School students who claimed to be an atheist. I told him that I believe that humans were incapable of writing the Torah. That proves to me that G-d exists. There is a wide array of belief systems among Jews, young and old. For me, personally, choosing to accept and follow the *mitzvot* in the Torah gives meaning, structure, and order to my life.

The Six-Day War in 1967 ended just before Shavuot. That's when some 200,000 people in Israel went for the first time to the Kotel (Western Wall). In subsequent years, after a full night of Torah learning, the streets of Jerusalem

are filled with Jews heading to the Wall. This tradition has biblical precedence. Shavuot is one of Judaism's three main pilgrimage festivals, when the entire nation would gather in Jerusalem for celebration and study. What a blessing that we can observe that pilgrimage today!

Following *mitzvot* is a personal choice. I don't have a right to judge anyone else's behavior. Since only G-d can understand each person's strengths and limitations, only G-d is capable of judging us.

This year Shavuot will be observed from May 25th to 27th. On Shavuot our community will celebrate the adult Bat Mitzvah of Sand Seligman. Sand is an example of a person who has committed herself to follow the *mitzvot* in her daily life to the best of her ability. This will be a milestone in her life, and the community is invited to attend, and support her.

I also warmly encourage you to attend the Bar Mitzvah of Josh Patriquin on May 5th and 6th. Both Sand and Josh have been working very hard to prepare for these meaningful rites of passage in their lives.


I hope all of you will have a happy and meaningful Shavuot holiday.


