From the Rabbi's Desk

Dear Friends,

<u>Changing the World One Candle and One MLK</u> <u>Ir. Day Speaker at Time</u>

To inaugurate this first bulletin edited by Robin Sylvern, a selfless and compassionate volunteer and friend, I would like to share highlights from our inspiring menorah lighting in December and, also, invite you to attend a community gathering on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, Monday, January 15th, that will further inspire all of us to engage in acts of selflessness and compassion.

I am writing this article the day after our community Hanukkah menorah lighting at the Keene Family Y, which was held on Thursday, December 14th, 3 Tevet 5784, the eighth and final night of Hanukkah. Though our event was moved from Keene's Central Square to the Y's gym to minimize the chances that an anti-Israel group would show up to protest, this second annual community celebration of Hanukkah was no less impactful than the first.

With over sixty Jews and others in attendance, CAA shared with our neighbors the message of light, hope, and peace that the ancient rabbis saw as Hanukkah's true significance. It was clear to me that the members of CAA are not the only ones seeking light, hope, and peace. As Israel's

war with Hamas rages on, as does the war between Russia and Ukraine, as humanity suffers the effects of global warming, and as social and political divisiveness continues to pervade our nation's discourse, all of us are searching for pathways toward a brighter future.

In my introduction to our candle lighting ceremony, which was based on a ceremony created by the American Jewish World Service, I offered the following reflection:

Each year, the Chanukah story reminds us that there is light even in the darkest of times. Our

Tradition beckons us to act in the face of the challenges before us: To have courage in the face of fear, to have hope in the face of anguish, to believe that good can triumph. Our world has faced innumerable obstacles this year-but just as our ancestors did, together we can seek out the light in our world. Where there is no light, we will create our own sparks.

Following this introduction, several individuals from CAA and the wider community each shared one of the following reflections as they illuminated one of the eight lightbulbs atop our 6' tall menorah:

First Light: By kindling this light, I spark CHANGE. Let this light inspire us to change our world.

Second Light: By kindling this light, I spark JOY. In savoring this tradition, let us celebrate courage and survival.

Third Light: *By kindling this light, I spark* DIGNITY. *Let us work to uphold the inherent worth of every human being.*

Fourth Light: By kindling this light, I spark GENEROSITY. Let us give to others – from our families and friends to people in need around the globe.

Fifth Light: By kindling this light, I spark COMMUNITY. Let us deepen our relationships and expand our circles to build kinship with people whose lives and views are different from our own.

Sixth Light: *By kindling this light, I spark* ACTION. *Let us raise our voices together to fight injustice all around us.*

Seventh Light: By kindling this light, I spark JUSTICE. Let us rededicate ourselves to tikkum olam—working to repair what's broken.

Eighth Light: By kindling this light, I spark HOPE. Let us persevere in our belief that a better world is possible.

To close the ceremony, I shared my prayers that "each of us, in our own way, create new sparks to shine the light of love and understanding on ourselves and all the peoples of the Earth" and that "our words and deeds bring all humanity closer in kinship and peace". Though these prayers are my own, they are inspired in part by the teachings of Father Greg Boyle, a Jesuit priest who founded and directs Homeboy Industries in Los Angeles, the largest agency in the world dedicated to gang intervention and rehabilitation.

It was very much Fr. Greg's spirit of love, tenderness, and kinship with the downtrodden that I was channeling as I spoke and prayed at our community menorah lighting.

As the coordinator of this year's Martin Luther King Jr. Day event for the City of Keene's Human Rights Committee, I have invited Fr. Greg Boyle to speak at Heberton Hall at the Keene Public Library at 6pm on Monday January 15th. Fr. Greg will speak to civic leaders, faith leaders, and students earlier in the day and will be accompanied by two of his homeboys, young men whose lives he helped transformed. I cannot encourage you strongly enough to attend Fr. Greg's Speech.

A Letter from the President Dear Congregation,

<u>ISRAEL</u>

I am filled with ambivalent feelings regarding the war in Israel. My feelings include rage, anger, fear, sadness, and profound disappointment.

Yet, I am also gratified to see the Jews of the world united. I want to explain my feelings further in this message.

I am so enraged by Hamas' barbaric atrocities committed on October 7th. These barbarisms included the following: killing over 1400 innocent civilians, kidnapping hundreds of civilians, raping women, and children, burning, decapitating, and even baking babies in ovens. It's too horrifying to comprehend. It reminds me of the atrocities of the Holocaust. Jews were - then, and now. I feel betrayed by my fellow citizens of America who have consistently advocated for the rights of others and championed the causes of marginalized populations. When Jews were attacked on October 7th, these people became suddenly quiet, claiming that Israel doesn't have a right to defend itself. These good-intentioned folks advocate for a cease fire, not understanding that that would mean that Hamas would continue to be an ongoing threat to Israel. People of this mindset are focusing on the civilian casualties of the Palestinians in Gaza and are not focusing on the unprovoked October 7th brutal attack and therefore Israel's need to defend itself. Why aren't these people advocating for Jews? It is strange that I also advocate for the rights of the LGBTQ community, for women, for Asians, and Blacks; I promote environmental causes. I actively campaign for housing for everyone; I have compassion toward animals, etc. But I part company with many Americans (and citizens of the world) who do not include advocacy for the Jews of the world in their list of noble causes.

Antisemitism on college campuses has been encouraged by an astonishingly large number of professors, administrators, and students. Facts about Israel have been completely distorted. There seems to be a lack of moral clarity when it comes to the right of Jews to survive.

I am outraged by the response of the United Nations. In the UN Security Council's voting for a cease fire, only the United States voted against this motion. Great Britain abstained. All the other countries voted in favor of the cease fire. I interpret this vote to mean that most of the countries of the UN desire Israel not to exist. That's a sobering thought. The UN has had a long history of biased and preposterous decisions directed at Israel. It's disheartening.



In his best-selling books Tattoos on the Heart and Barking to the Choir, Fr. Greg shares story after story of the power of love and tenderness to heal shattered hearts and build lives of meaning. While Fr. Greg approaches the world as a devout Jesuit and writes through the lens of a particular version of Catholic theology, nothing that he teaches is inaccessible to anyone with an open heart. As a rabbi and as an imperfect human being, I do not yet share his radical, unconditional approach to love, tenderness, kinship, and forgiveness that animates his work. The approach of Judaism that I've internalized through life and learning reflects the wariness of a people whose historical experience in a cruel world leads us to tolerate limits on the values that, for Fr. Greg, know no limits. Yet, I am so blown away by Fr. Greg's integrity and consistency – and his track record of turning lives around – that I am motivated to find glimpses of his absolute open – heartedness within my own tradition. I can't help but think I will be a better person if I succeed, and that the world will be a better place. When you hear Fr. Greg Speak on January 15th, you'll know exactly what I'm talking about.

The prophet Zechariah envisions a messianic age that is brought about "not by might, nor by power, but by God's spirit" (4:6). The words of Fr. Greg Boyle, no less than the words of the prophet Zechariah, which we read in the haftarah for Hanukkah, should motivate each of us to live by that spirit. Finding that spirit and making it our own is what is required to create the sparks talked about at our community menorah lighting: sparks of change, joy, dignity, generosity, community, action, justice, and hope.

Our next dates at TCK are Thursday, January 18th, and Thursday, February 15th., and Thursday February 29th.



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
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
