From the Rabbi's Desk

THE COMMUNITY SYNAGOGUE OF

THE MONADNOCK REGION.

As we did on Shabbat Shirah, the Shabbat of Song, we read Shirat Hayam, The Song of the Sea (Exodus 15:1-18) from the Torah on the Shabbat of Pesach. Shirat Hayam is the song that Moses and the people of Israel joyously sang upon reaching the far side of the Sea of Reeds after the sea closed in on their pursuers. Our ancestors realized they were now free and safe. As Hazzan Michael Kasper pointed out during his visit to CAA with the singing group Kolot Shonim in February, Shirat Hayam is the first time we hear our people sing. Many miracles had happened to our ancestors prior to this, but this is the first one that elicits a song. We've reenacted that wondrous vocal act for thousands of years by using a special melody reserved specifically for the chanting of Exodus 15:1-8 plus a few verses before and after "the song."

Why is this? What is the Torah trying to teach us?

I believe *Shirat Hayam* appears where it does in the story of our redemption from Egypt to remind us that only when we are truly free can we fully express our innermost joy and only when we are free from fear, judgment and oppression can we be our most creative selves. Decades-old research into the creative process validates the Torah's ancient wisdom: we are at our most creative when we are at our most relaxed, our most mindful, our most free.

Indeed, elsewhere in the Book of Exodus and beyond we read about all kinds of creative achievements, from the formation of the priesthood and the sacrifi-

cial system to the construction of the *mishkan*, the Tabernacle, and all its accoutrements. Eventually the priestly system will incorporate instrumental music and the singing of Psalms, and the Tabernacle itself will come to embody the creative spirit of the Jewish people. In fact, Israel's foremost

art institute, Betzalel, is named after the chief architect and builder of the Tabernacle. All these creative achievements take place during the wandering in the wilderness and in our own land -- when we are a free People.

Of course, the greatest creative act that human beings are capable of is the act of childbirth. The events preceding *Shirat Hayam* evoke the birthing process of the people of Israel: this motley band of Hebrew slaves and other sojourners longing for freedom passes from a place of literal and metaphorical darkness through a narrow, moist canal and emerges into a wide-open space filled with light and possibility. Unlike in childbirth, though, Israel's first cry is not a cry at all; it is a song.

We sing an excerpt from *Shirat Hayam* everytime we time we pray at night and in the morning.

Mi chamocha ba'eilim, Adonai? Mi chamocha nedar bakodesh? Norah tehilot, oseh feleh?

Who is like You, O God, among the gods who are worshipped?

Who is like You, majestic in holiness, awesome in splendor, working wonders?

In the evening, we continue:

Your children beheld Your sovereignty when You divided the sea before Moses.

"This is my God," they exclaimed, and declared:"Adonai will reign forever."

In the morning we continue:

With a new song, inspired at the shore of the Sea, the redeemed sang Your praise.

In unison they all offered thanks, acknowledging Your sovereignty they said: "Adonai will reign forever."

When we sing these words, we recall the crowning moment of our redemption, pun intended. It's good to be free! It's good to be alive!

Imagine what these words have meant to our ancestors who've lived under oppression in Rome, in Spain, in Nazi Germany, in the Soviet Union. Imagine what these words must mean to our hostages who are being freed after over 490 days in darkness! Our brothers and sisters who were lucky enough to survive their ordeal are not only free, they are reborn. Perhaps a contemporary version of Mi Chamocha would look like this:

Who is like You, O God, among the gods who are worshipped?

Who is like You, majestic in holiness, awesome in splendor, working wonders?

In the open spaces of freedom, let us together give thanks and celebrate God's sovereignty!

The crossing of the sea symbolizes all those times in the history of the Jewish People and in our lives as individuals when we've emerged from places of distress and despair, when we've overcome trying circumstances, when we've regained our sense of wholeness and our well-being. Let us always treasure our freedom as a creative People and do so with a song of joy on our lips.

My family and I wish you a sweet and joyous Pesach,

Our listening sessions will give us the chance

to share stories, to listen deeply, to deepen in our understanding and to allow our heart to join in communal creativity and compassionate action for our Monadnock community. This is a wonderful opportunity to listen and to be heard, and I hope many of you will participate.

My goal as your president has been to work on fulfilling the needs of our community, specifically at CAA, but also the needs of our larger Monadnock community as well. We are a flourishing and vibrant voice of the Jewish people in Southwestern New Hampshire and have much to be proud of.



"The Assistant is the story of Morris Bober, neighborhood grocer, his wife, Ida, and their daughter, Helen. Their life is hard and small, fraught with ill luck and disappointment. When Frank Alpine becomes Morris Bober's assistant, things take a turn for the better. Frank, whose reactions to Jews is ambivalent, falls in love with Helen Bober. He begins to steal from the store. There is this kind of dual-leveled, doubleworking meaning that begins to work through the story ... It is the lucidity of this story that makes it distinctive and that makes Mr. Malamud's vision shine simply throughout the stumblings and strugglings. In Mr. Malamud's hands, Frank Alpine, the alien and outsider, becomes a kind of redeemer. The speech of these people is marvelously true and adds another dimension to the story that is told." Yahrzeits are listed according to the Hebrew date, so the English date will vary from year to year. Kaddish may be recited on the Shabbat nearest the date of remembrance. RECIPES

Passover Rolls

3+ tbsp. sugar 1 cup Matza meal 3 eggs 34 cup water 44 cup oil

Bring oil, water, and sugar to boil. Add matza meal. Stir and remove from heat. Add eggs one at a time, beat after each egg.

Either wet hands and roll into small balls and place on greased cookie sheet or use a large spoon and spoon batter on greased cookie sheet.

Bake 45 minutes at 375-400°F

Charoset (Jerusalem style) 5-6 servings

5 dates dash of ginger 1-2 apples ¼ tsp cinnamon Small handful of walnuts & almonds

1-3 tbs wine

Grind dates, apples, nuts separately. Mix together, adding ginger and cinnamon and enough wine to make it a thick mixture, not to dilute it.

Mrs. Feinberg's Vegetable Kugel

1 cup grated apples 1 tsp salt

1 cup grated sweet potato1 tsp baking soda1 cup grated carrot1 tsp cinnamon1 cup matzah meal1 tsp nutmeg

½ cup pareve margarine, melted

½ cup sugar(optional)

Preheat oven to 325°F, Grease a 10" casserole or muffin tin. Mix all ingredients together well. Pour into the baking dish. Cover with aluminum foil and bake 45 minutes. If using muffin tins, bake 30 minutes.

Raise oven to 350°F, remove cover and bake an additional 15 minutes. Slice and eat hot as a vegetable with meat.

Note: A food processor makes this recipe effortless.

Mock Chopped Liver (very good)

3 tbs. oil ½ lb. mushrooms

1-2 onions 1 cup nuts

1 tbs. water salt and pepper to taste

Sauté onions until translucent and mushrooms. Put everything in food processor and blend till smooth. Serve chilled.
