From the Rabbi's Desk

Takeaways from the Reconstructionist Convening in December

For three hours on Sunday, December 15th, I sat in rapt attention before my computer screen listening with an open heart as rabbis from the Reconstructionist Rabbinical Association and representatives from Reconstructing Judaism spoke about their relationships with the Land, People, and State of Israel and with the Palestinian people. This was a movement-wide convening--hastily but thoughtfully and nearly flawlessly produced--that was intended "to take a close and nuanced look at what binds us in covenantal community, even during this time of deep crisis."

It was not always easy to hear what the speakers had to say, but it felt critically important to be present as they spoke. And, while I didn't get what I was hoping for, I did take away more than I expected.

Before sharing brief reflections, I should note that I am writing these words before hearing responses to the program from anyone in our community who might have logged in or might view whatever recordings are made available in the coming weeks. It is likely that within our community there will be a variety of strong reactions and much discussion before this bulletin lands in your mailboxes. So keep in mind that I am sharing raw thoughts here that will inevitably shift over the coming weeks as I hear from you and as I think more about what I've heard, how I feel, and what I believe.

What I was hoping would come out of this gathering was that rabbis, rabbinical students, and others, who explicitly or implicitly represent Reconstructionist Judaism while calling themselves "anti-Zionist," would be told respectfully that activism in the

name of dismantling the Jewish State falls outside the bounds of Reconstructing Judaism's "covenantal community." In this respect, I walked away emptyhanded. To be fair, though, any such declaration would probably have to be voted upon by the movement and its rabbis at their respective conventions, which will take place in March 2026 and March 2025, respectively.

One thing I took away from the program was appreciation for the pain experienced by so many people within the Reconstructionist orbit, a pain that is rooted in a deep love for both Eretz and Am Yisrael, the Land and People of Israel, and for all human beings, who are created in the image of the Divine. The pain was articulated best by two rabbis, whom I know and admire, who have been living in Israel for about 25 years each. Both are ardent Zionists and Reconstructionists and activists for peace, justice, and democracy. Neither sounded hopeful, and yet neither would consider abandoning Israel or the Palestinians they know and love. One broke into tears while quoting these words from President Abraham Lincoln's Second Inaugural Address in 1865: "With malice toward none with charity for all... let us strive on to finish the work we are in to bind up the nation's wounds, to care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow and his orphan ~ to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace among ourselves and with all nations." All who spoke expressed a similar devotion to Israel and longed for a "just and lasting peace."

Another takeaway was the idea that dividing the community into Zionists and anti-Zionists is not especially helpful or particularly meaningful. We have set up a binary way of thinking about our

relationship with Israel: you either love the State of Israel or you hate the State of Israel; you either love the People of Israel or you love the Palestinians; you either want Israel to thrive or you want it to disappear. This binary, though, does not represent reality. What most people want is simply something better than what we have now, and it almost doesn't matter how we get there, whether that be one state, two states, or something entirely different. Most of us want democracy, justice, and freedom for everyone who shares that small parcel of land, no matter what we call ourselves.

We are also wise to remember that Zionism has not always been associated with statehood. Thinkers like Ahad Ha-Am and Mordecai Kaplan were primarily interested in having Judaism take root once again in the historic homeland of the Jewish people alongside the Arab population that had been there for centuries before 1948. Jewish settlement in Eretz Yisrael was supposed to revitalize the Jewish soul both in the Land and in the diaspora. For Ahad Ha-Am and Kaplan the state was a means to this end, not an end in and of itself. Sadly, too few Jews in the diaspora today derive such inspiration from our co-religionists in Eretz Yisrael who, as citizens of the State of Israel, feel so dispirited. Near the end of the program, the question was asked if Kaplan would call himself a Zionist today. If Zionisim means nothing more than a commitment to a Jewish nation-state as an end in itself --as opposed to the eternal striving to build a Jewish homeland where Jews and Judaism can thrive securely-- perhaps not.

The virtual gathering of the Reconstructionist movement was intended to mark a new stage in a critical conversation that has already begun. We are not the only movement where the conversation about our relationship to Israel and the Palestinian people is taking place, however. Regardless of how you identify Jewishly, I hope you will commit to hearing what is difficult to hear and staying engaged in respectful conversation.

Laura was delighted when I told her about my newfound appreciation of opera in the early years of my marriage to Lainee. I was brought up with a pervasive moral education based in synagogue and Jewish values. I wasn't brought up being exposed to opera! Lainee grew up on the lawn of Tanglewood, watching renowned conductors and performers. Laura encouraged and assisted Lainee and Dan (Lainee's brother) in committing themselves to music professions. I observed Laura having close friendships with other people with similar cultivated interests. Yet, she was also giving to people with various needs. She was truly kind to everyone. These are the root values that led to her bringing up her successful and compassionate family members.

Laura Broad transmitted values to our family that encouraged us to spread our wings and go out into the world in a meaningful way. We live lives of integrity. We value helping others. We appreciate music. The art of becoming a mensch was passed on from our previous generation.



Join the CAA Book Discussion



The CAA Book Club will meet on Sunday, January 5, 2025.

We'll be discussing *The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store* by James McBride.

The author describes how, in 1972, when workers in Pottstown, Pennsylvania, were digging the foundations for a new development, the last thing they expected to find was a skeleton at the bottom of a well. Who the skeleton was and how it got there were two of the longheld secrets kept by the residents of Chicken Hill, the dilapidated neighborhood where immigrant Jews and African Americans lived side by side and shared ambitions and sorrows.

Chicken Hill was where Moshe and Chona Ludlow lived when Moshe integrated his theater and where Chona ran the Heaven & Earth Grocery Store. When state officials came looking for a deaf boy in order to institutionalize him, it was Chona and Nate Timblin, the Black janitor at Moshe's theater and the unofficial leader of the Black community on Chicken Hill, who worked together to keep the boy safe.

As these characters' stories overlap and deepen, it becomes clear how much the people who live on the margins of white Christian America struggle and what they must do to survive. When the truth is finally revealed about what happened on Chicken Hill and the part the town's white establishment played in it, McBride shows us that even in dark times, it is love and community — heaven and earth — that sustain us.

Tu-B'Shvat Recipes

Date-Fig Bars

Filling:

3 cups of dates & figs 1 cup hot water 1 Tbs +1 tsp lemon juice 1/4 tsp salt 2 tsp vanilla

Crust:

1½ cups rolled oats
1 cup brown sugar
1½ cups whole wheat pastry flour or all-purpose flour
¾ tsp baking soda
¾ tsp salt
½ cup chopped walnuts or pecans

3/4 cup unsalted butter, melted

Directions:

Filling:

- 1. In saucepan, combine the ingredients, bring to a boil, reduce heat to low, and simmer for about 5 minutes. The mixture will thicken after a few minutes.
- 2. Remove from heat and set aside to cool, (I ran the immersion blender through it to give it a nice smooth texture and let it sit for a while.

Crust:

- 1. Whisk together the dry ingredients (except nuts) and then add the melted butter. Stir until well combined.
- 2. Lightly grease a 9x9" pan and press 2½ cups of the crust mixture into the pan, smoothing it out to fill the bottom with no gaps.
- 3. Spread the filling on the crust. Add the nuts to the remaining crust mixture and sprinkle it over the filling.
- 4. Bake for 30 minutes at 350°F, until golden brown. Let cool before cutting.

Deluxe Buckwheat Almond Cake with Raspberry Filling

Ingredients:

1½ cups skin on sliced almonds ¾ cup unsalted butter, softened ¾ cup sugar, divided 4 eggs, separated 2 tsp vanilla ⅓ tsp salt ½ cup light buckwheat flour ½ cup raspberry preserves 10" round paper lace doily 1 Tbs confectioners' sugar

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F
- 2. Oil bottom of 9x1½" round cake pan and line with waxed paper. Finely grind almonds in food processor, blender or nut chopper.
- 3. In large bowl, cream butter and 6 tbs sugar. Beat in yolks, one at a time. Stir in vanilla and almonds.
- 4. In medium bowl, beat egg whites and salt to soft peaks; gradually add remaining sugar, beating until soft, glossy peaks form. Lightly fold ¼ of the beaten whites into batter. Sift ¼ flour over batter; combine lightly. Alternately add remaining whites and flour in this manner.
- 5. Pour batter into pan. Bake at 350°F for 30 minutes or until tester inserted into center comes out clean. Cool on rack 10 minutes; remove from pan.
- 6. When cool, slice horizontally into 2 layers. Place bottom layer, cut side up, on plate; spread with preserves. Top with remaining layer, cut side down. Place doily on top; sprinkle with confectioners' sugar; remove doily.


